

## **ALA Integration: A Continuing Process**

On of the changes that has taken place this year at Beaver is the integration of ALA (American Language Academy) students with American students in the dormitories. In previous years, all resident ALA students were living together in Thomas Hall. The change was made in hope that this novel arrangement would provide a greater opportunity for the foreign students to learn about the American way of life and, of course, to practice their English outside the classroom. As the result, the ALA students (most of whom are

men) are scattered throughout the different dormitories. Some of them are living on the same floor with Beaver students, but most are living on Heinz 2nd West-which is an ALA floor.

What effect does this change have on the ALA and American students? So far, it has been generally positive. Of the ALA students that were surveyed, all are happly to have an opportunity to live in the same dorm with the Americans. However, it seems the people who benefit most from this change are the ones that live on the same floor with the Americans. In this

way they have a better chance to interact socially, and perhaps academically with Beaver students, than the people who live on Heinz 2nd West. Unfortunately, those living on this floor are still somewhat isolated from the Americans.

As for the American themselves (RAs and residents of the affected halls were surveyed) most of them are optimistic about this integration. Like the ALA students, the Americans believe that this arrangement will unlock the doors for the two sides to exchange their culture, language and life

styles. Hopefully, this will also lead to a more open and closer friendship among foreigners and Americans.

Finally, Gil Allewelt (RA on Heinz 2nd West) who has been an RA to the ALA students for six years, admits that the change is a good move. However, because the whole floor is still all ALA residents, there is as yet no noticable difference from living in Thomas Hall. Thus there hasn't been much contact between foreign and American students there. In addition, he also thinks that it

is still too early in the year to tell. Nevertheless, The Director of ALA Housing, Wynne Curry says, "I think it's the greatest thing that ever hap-pened to them." She certainly would want this arrangement to continue in the future.

So in conclusion, the integration is well received by both the ALA and American students. The year has just begun. It will take some time' before one can see the true outcome of this change. At that time, this situation will be pursued again.

Dr. Wilson feels that Beaver's greatest need, at the present time, is the aquisition of endowments for the improvement of the college. He intends to attain these funds by making Beaver more visible to the community and by cultivating supporters

through persistent long-range planning. He aims to keep working at this goal even if the results don't appear immediately.

In addition, Dr. Wilson feels that Beaver's location, faculty, size, reputation, and most of all, potential for improvement, are its best and most important assets.

Dr. Wilson is very interested in the growth of the school on many different levels. He believes that the academic goals should be aimed at the growth of the mind and at the improvement of thinking skills rather than merely at the maintenance of previously learned skills. Also, he believes that the addition of a new multi-purpose

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gym will cause both a growth in extra-curricular activities and social activities, in addition to helping to leveling out the male to female ratio on campus. "The building of a gym," according to Dr. Wilson is "very much a prime concern" He also believes potential new students would be attracted by a more extensive intercollegiate sport roster.

Dr. Wilson has also indicated an interest in the continuing education program. "Reaching out to the community at large and creating new transitional programs to refamiliarize those re-joining the college atmosphere are very important to the program."

### **Drop/Add Information**

Final deadline for the drop/add period was this past Monday, September 19. It is no longer possible to add on an additional course; nowever, students can drop courses up until the end of the semester. Certain procedures must be followed.

If a student wishes to drop a course up to midsemester, which is October 26, he or she must first obtain a drop/add form from the Registrar's Office. This form must then be signed by the student's advisor, instructor, and Mrs. Landau. Once this process is completed, the course will be officially dropped with no

penalty, although a "W" meaning "Withdrawal" will appear on the student's official transcript.

Students who wish to drop a course after October 26 must formally petition, and only under unusual circumstances will such petitions be accepted. In addition, those students who do drop after midsemester will receive a "W" on their transcripts in addition to a "P" or "F" in accordance with their performance in the class.

Any additional questions or difficulties concerning drop/add should be addressed to Mrs. Landau in the Registrar's Office.

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- \* THAT Beaver's focus on integrating liberal and career education preceded by eight years is a trend that is just now occurring in higher educational thinking;

- \* THAT Beaver just received a second grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) to disseminate our model freshmen seminar program in problem solving, critical thinking and collaborative learning (INQUIRE) to other colleges and universities across the country;
- \* THAT OUR Community Scholars Program, featured in the September 9 issue of the Beaver News, although not nationally unique, is probably the first of its kind in the Delaware Valley; and
- \* THAT . . . (I could go on and on. I haven't even touched on the recognized quality of some of our majors and of our graduate study division, or on some of the unique programming available in our career services, etc.)

Too often, we at Beaver forget that our College is truly special. Over the last several decades it has been in the forefront of curriculum innovation. This broad-based and sound curriculum foundation has helped many of our graduates to go on to achieve exemplary records in programs of advanced study and in their professional lives. You, as current students, have educational opportunities that many other colleges and universities are just beginning to incorporate in their planning for the future. I urge you to take advantage of these opportunities. Thus, when someone asks you where you go to college, you can be justly proud; for when you graduate, you know that you will be a little unique for having been a part of that special educational experience that comes from attending a quality, trend-setting institution.



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### Bon Appétit!



Still undecided, I marched off to my last class of the day, which happened to be Constitutional Law. As interesting as Article I, Section 2 of the United States Constitution is, all I could think about was how exhausting the week had been. As class drew close to an end, I remember thinking to myself "Thank Goodness it's Friday". Almost intrinsically, I knew that this week's review would be of T.G.I. Friday's.

T.G.I. Fridays is a restaurant with a wonderful menu that could be complimented endlessly. But I have decided to share with you, three extremely tasty items. The entree that I chose to review is a long standing favorite of mine. It's called Charbroiled Shrimp and consists of jumbo shrimp butterflied and marinated in a lemon wine sauce then charbroiled for flavor.
