Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale will do a better job as president providing a fair tax reform for the middle class?

- Mondale -- Reagan

Walter Mondale proposes to cap benefits that Reagan alloted to the wealthy. Ronald Reagan allowed America's 2% tax bracket to enjoy the lightest tax burden in history. Furthermore, Reagan allowed America's 100 most profitable firms to virtually escape taxation.

Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale would do a better job as president on making you better off financially?

- Mondale -- Reagan

It is true that inflation has been reduced from over 10% to 4% annually, unemployment down slightly, and the prime interest rate down from 21% to 12%, but, these figures are deceiving. The average American's disposable income is 8% lower than it was four years ago.

Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale would do a better job as president on keeping America out of war?

- Mondale -- Reagan For more than 30 years, every presidential administration has successfully concluded arms control agreements with the Soviet Union. Walter Mondale believes in a sturdy defense. He also stands in the middle of a bi-partisan community that has abandoned the nation of nuclear superiority. Rather, he represents those who aspire for a varifiable, bilateral nuclear freeze, and continues with a 19 point program for arms reduction.

Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale is more knowledgeable about the issues?

- Mondale -- Reagan

Walter Mondale has been running on an issues confrontation platform. Mondale has consistently answered direct questions on foreign policy, social security, taxes, federal deficit, national health policies and education. President Reagan has continually sidestepped direct questions, as was evident in both presidential debates. Furthermore, when Reagan answered questions, he did so in gross generalities.

Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale supports the Equal Rights Amendment?

- Mondale -- Reagan

Ronald Reagan and the Republicans tell us that women don't need the ERA. Walter Mondale would throw out Reagan appointees to the Civil Rights Commission and provide strong enforcement of the Voting Rights Act. Walter Mondale supports the ERA and full rights for women and minorities.

Do you think Ronald Reagan or Walter Mondale will, as president, do more for educational?

- Mondale -- Reagan.

Ronald Reagan slashed aid to public schools: he cut college loan programs, depriving over 800,000 low/moderate income students the funds needed to help complete their education. On the other hand, Walter Mondale urges a ten billion dollar infusion of new funds to upgrade public schools and increase teacher pay. Mondale promises to protect and expand college loan programs for children of workers and the needy so that every qualified student will have a chance at higher education.


Do you think Walter Mondale or Ronald Reagan would do more as president to reduce the federal deficit?

- Mondale -- Reagan

To quote President Reagan, "the national debt was the equivalent to a stack of \$1,000 bills 67 miles high." But since that statement, which was calling for a balanced budget amendment, he has raised the deficit stack another 40 miles. Walter Mondale made a bold political statement by proposing to reduce the deficit by raising taxes and reducing government waste.

Democrats, Mondale and Ferraro, are committed to restoring America's competitive edge. The only way that will work is through an economic program that looks to the future. Such an economic program would invest in education and basic research and job training; end Republican tax give-aways to giant multinational corporations; give small businesses a better chance to compete; and take a tough stand against unfair trade practices by America's competitors.

Ronald Reagan should be given due credit for what he has done during his term. Your decision should depend on who will offer a brighter promise for the 1985-1988 term. The issue is the future; the decision is yours. VOTE Mondale/Ferraro!
