# Admissions Reports Increase In Applicants

Many colleges and universities in the Philadelphia area and across the country are reporting a decline in the number of submitted applications to their respective institutions. Beaver, however, is experiencing the opposite. The most recent figures for the 1989-90 academic year suggest an increase in applicants of 12-16%.

An article in a recent Philadelphia Inquirer stated that University of Pennsylvania, Harvard, Yale, Drexel, Bryn Mawr, Bucknell, Penn State and others are receiving fewer applications than in previous years. Like Beaver, a few other colleges in the area, such as Swarthmore and Villanova, are also reporting increases in numbers of applicants. Percentage wise, however, Beaver has higher numbers.

Speculation places the reason for the increase with high ratings in the U.S. News and World Report magazine poll from October 1988. All three colleges ranked high on their respective lists. The decline has been attributed to smaller high school graduating classes, due to fewer numbers of people in that age bracket in the general population.

According to the article, it is predicted that from 1988-1992, there will be approximately 250,000 fewer high school graduates in Pennsyl-

vania and approximately 18,000 fewer in New Jersey. The northeast region is expected to be hit hardest due to declining birth rates and high emigration to other parts of the country.

In an interview with Neil D. Holtzman, Dean of Admissions, I learned of other reasons why Beaver is experiencing a rise in the numbers. There is a high level of uncertainty about being accepted to the very prestigious colleges, which leads to people sending out more applications, to be on the safe side. Dean Holtzman pointed out that there may not be more people applying, but people are sending out more applications. Besides more applicants, Beaver is also receiving a higher number of inquiries. With all the conflicting statistics, there is more work and less predictability and certainty about next year's freshman class.

Current high school seniors who have been accepted can expect to receive telephone calls from faculty mentors and members, admissions, and students. They will receive information by mail and their parents may hear from a Board of Trustees member. The students also have the option of visiting the campus on a tour, for an interview or spend a day here. If using a VCR is their preference, they can watch the prepared video about

the College.

This year new brochures and a new viewbook were created. Dean Holtzman believes that their presence has also aided the recruiting effort. The College does not want to be like a machine and over burden the student; it does want to five prospective students as many opportunities, though, to learn about what it has to offer. Recruiting students is very important, but retaining them is also a high priority. The Dean wants students to feel like they were treated as adults and with respect, from their first inquiry; hopefully, those feelings will continue during all four years

The College does not plan on relaxing any of its criteria in order to attract more students. In order for a student to be accepted, Admissions first looks at the student's academic record. The record includes:

1. the degree of competitiveness of the student's high school;

2. courses selected in high school;3. patterns of grades.

The College also examines SAT scores, recommendations, work, extra-curricular

activities and interviews. All aspects of a persons life are considered, in order to give the student the fairest possible chance.

Dean Holtzman does not believe that the choice to cancel the overnight portion of Background at Beaver Day will hurt the numbers. Instead, the Day on Campus program has been expanded to include an overnight option. He also mentioned that enrollment is not solely Admission's responsibility. The College has to have its product be consistent and acceptable in people's minds for any recruiting to work.

On Wednesday afternoon, February 8, 1989, Darryl Robinson was arrested by Cheltenham Police Office David Sparks for Peeping Tom actions. According to Beaver College Chief of Security Joe Calogero's incident report, the following activity occurred:

A female employee of the College using the women's restroom located on the first floor of the Classroom Building, spotted Robinson in the bathroom at the same time as her. When asked what he was doing, Robinson left. The staff member then followed him and watched as he left the Classroom Building and entered the library.

Once he was in the library, the employee called Security to report the incident. Calogero took the call and forwarded the information to the Cheltenham Township Police Station, requesting assistance. He then radioed for another security officer to accompany him and the two proceeded to the library. Once in the library, the two officers saw Robinson and asked him to come with them to the library foyer, which he did.

While in the foyer, Robinson admitted to having entered the women's bathroom in the Classroom Building. A couple of minutes later Police Officer Sparks arrived and confirmed Robinson's identity. At that point, Robinson was arrested and later taken to Cheltenham Police Headquarters. The female employee and a second witness were also questioned about

the incident and asked to identify Robinson, which they did. At headquarters, Robinson was charged in front of Justice L. Leader where bail was set for \$10,000. Unable to pay, Robinson was sent to Montgomery County Prison, and a hearing was set for the following week.

On February 13, a hearing was held concerning Robinson's immediate future. It was decided that he will undergo psychiatric treatment for a minimum of 60 days at a mental institution. After his treatment ends, Robinson will once again appear before Justice Leader; she will then determine whether he will be allowed to go or be put on trial. According to the report, Justice Leader informed Robinson that if he

# Board of Trustees Report

On Certain Fridays each semester you may find fewer parking spaces and more cars on campus. Though an inconvenience for a number of hours, there is a good reason for the problem. The College's Board of Trustees meets every two months to discuss matters directly associated with the College's future. As SGO Chancellor, one of my responsibilities is to attend these meetings on behalf of all students.

The most recent meeting was held on Friday, February 17. As in the past, I prepared a written report for the Board. To truly represent the student body fairly and equally, I asked other undergraduates for input concerning my agenda; I have mainly consulted senators and club officers. In previous meetings this academic year, I discussed issues such as the quality of the food, the lack of parking spaces, our search for a mascot, and other major student concerns. to be com-

pletely partial is difficult, but I try not to give a skewed report in any direction. The board members seem to appreciate hearing both positive and negative comments. In fact, after mentioning our dissatisfaction with the food, I saw the Chairman of the Board eating in the cafeteria. At the last meeting, I mentioned a number of issues with the main ones being the Castle's upkeep, condom machines and the Student Activities Center. I also stated that the food has become more accommodating, especially to vegetarians.

They were especially interested in the condom machines. Since I have brought up the issue before, they wanted to know why there has been a delay in their installation. Many students have posed that same question. To respond to other issues of great concern, there is a Board of Trustees Student Affairs Committee, made up of one or two board members, the Dean of Students and a number of students.

Another way that students can tell the Board their opinion on what needs to be done is to compile a list of specific priorities. For example, we might say that we strongly believe we should have an athletic facility on campus and would like to know how much it will cost. President Landman has compiled a list of priorities, but they are a bit more theoretical. They include sending more Beaver students abroad, closing the malefemale ratio in an effort to truly become coeducational, attracting more minority students and employees and establishing a stronger financial base enabling the College to move forward. The president indicated a vary strong commitment to fulfilling the students'

One possible change aimed towards giving the Beaver student a better education included spending a semester off campus, either abroad, working or at another university. She also is aware of

our need and desire for an athletic facility. However, when that awareness becomes a reality is still undecided as funds have to be raised.

In order to present the Board with a solid list of priorities, I need your help. What do you believe to be the ten most important and pressing issues on campus? They can be theoretical or

specific. Whichever category they fall into does not matter; what does matter is your input. Talk to your senator or to me directly. I will take all suggestions and list them in a chronological order, as indicated by your preference. Please, tell me what you want, so we can demonstrate our dedication to the College is not just hot air.



# "Legal' Cooking With Steph and Sue"

Welcome back to our kitchen. We hope you enjoyed your winter break. Now onto the recipe. Today's recipe is for making Krispie Treats in your hot pot. These are the ingredients you will need:

1/2 a bag of minmarshmallows

Continued from page 1 leaves the mental health program before doctors decide he is ready, she will put him back in prison.

Robinson has had prior arrests dating back to when he was a juvenile; some of his priors include peeping tom actions. This incident however, marks the first time he was ever put in prison. He also has a twin brother; the two have been known to interchange their names and identities on occasion.

In an effort to keep security levels at their highest, I held an interview with Calogero. To insure quick responses by a security officer, as described above, the person witnessing an incident has to call security (x2999) right away. If the guards are patrolling on one side of campus, they will not necessarily hear something happening on the other side. Yet a dispatcher is always available, and once the call is received it is passed on immediately to an officer. When you call, be sure to give as much information as possible, but especially your name, location and full description of everything going on around you. If there are any vehicles involved, try to get a license plate number. If people are involved, try to give a thorough description of them. Security needs your name in case they have any follow ups or need to confirm something. Other suggestions for better protection include some common sense measures:

\*BE AWARE OF YOUR SURROUNDINGS

\*DO NOT PROP DOORS
\*BE CAUTIOUS WHEN
LEAVING YOUR ROOM - IF
GOING OUT, CLOSE YOUR
DOOR

Some changes with Security have been occurring as well. All students should have received a brochure in their mailboxes about ACT 73 and other security measures. Security officers now have photo-id's taken, while in uniform. They have to wear them at all times, so if you see an officer without his, say something. There are currently 17 security officers patrolling the campus. More guards are on at night than in the day. And certain officers have been assigned stake out type patrols.

If you have any questions or suggestions about security or security personnel, speak to your RA, CA or Calogero himself. They will follow through, but they will not know what is bothering you if you do not tell them. The Security office is located on the ground floor of Thomas, near Physical Plant.




