


Your Sexual Awareness

They are coming, and they are going to be here soon. Yes, the "they" are condoms. But what exactly does that statement mean to Beaver College students? Will we be seeing condom balloons all over campus? Hopefully not. But the question of their usage has yet to be determined. Students have stated that they will use them, but time will tell. A number of people may not know how to put them on correctly, which could result in the transmission of STD's or unwanted pregnancy. Therefore, it is our personal responsibility as students to learn as much as possible about sexually related issues. The health center offers a variety of services and educational programs designed to enlighten students about themselves.

If you believe you may have contracted the HIV virus, the health center offers anonymous AIDS testing for students, in conjunction with Abington Hospital. There is



a cost of \$35.00 for the lab work. If the fee is too much for a student, then Dr. Pezzi will recommend a clinic

which offers free testing. When using Abington Hospital, the results may take up to two weeks to come in. If

they are positive, a second test is conducted for confirmation; this will take another seven days. Once the results are in, only the doctor will have access to your results; they are not accessible to the nursing staff.

Other services provided by the health center include prescribing birth control for women. Before doctor will prescribe any form of medication, the woman has to have a PAP smear test done. This is for her protection. Again, the files are confidential. The pill is the only form of birth control that the health center will issue. Therefore, having condom machines in the dormitories may alleviate some unwanted situations.

Student Affairs has decided to put the machines in bathrooms in the dormitories on certain floors. Below is a list of the locations where the machines will be going.




In addition to all of the work that has been going into exploring the athletic facility, an Athletic and Recreation Advisory Committee has been set up to discuss the athletic and recreational needs of the campus. the committee has already had its first meeting and is well on its way to doing something advantageous.

Radon Testing

Radon is a colorless, odorless gas which, when found in high quantities, can be harmful. One effect of this gas is lung cancer. When smoking and radon are combined, this increases the risk of lung cancer. The EPA blames radon for five thousand to twenty thousand lung cancer deaths per year.

The recent concern for radon on campus is because of the testing done at the Westminster Seminary, approximately two miles away from Beaver. After being tested, it was found that the level of radon is ten times higher than previously measured.

Preliminary tests at Beaver College indicate that radon levels are not dangerous, according to school officials. According to John Fox, Assistant Director of College Relations, all thirteen buildings are undergoing tests which take five days to complete and another week for the results to come back from the lab. If it is discovered that some buildings do have high levels of radon than venting would take care of the problem.

In addition, according to Bob Edwards, Plant Manager, all dormitories and most

of the academic buildings are undergoing longevity tests that are ongoing and take six months to a year to complete. Over the weekend of February 25, 26, and 27th computerized equipment was brought in and the Castle, Boyer and Heinz Hall were tested. the Castle and Boyer were under the EPA's allowance of 4.0 picoquies while Heinz Hall had a reading of 4.2, just a hair over the allowance. In comparison, when tested, Westminster Seminary had a reading of 1200-2000 picoquies. Bob Edwards feels confident that the test results from Beaver will be very low. He also stated when all the test results are in a letter will be sent to everyone to calm their fears and also to let the people know what is going on.

Dear Beaver College
Sophomore,

As the largest and best known study abroad service in the United States, we especially welcome the interest of our own students and would like to help you to include study abroad in your junior year. The enclosed brochures describe the distinctive features and curriculum of the programs we sponsor in Great Britain, Ireland and Vienna.

Since you are a sophomore in good standing with a grade point average of 2.8 or better, you qualify for admission to most of the programs we sponsor. At a minimum, we can guarantee you a place on the London Semester Program or on the London Humanities Semester. Both of these programs are described in the Study in Britain booklet, pages 127-137 and 139-145 respectively. Please note that the Humanities Semester requires background and a 3.0 g.p.a.

To be guaranteed a place on one of these programs for next year, either for fall

1989 or spring 1990, you must submit a completed guaranteed placement form to our office by March 6. We would need your completed application to study abroad and a non-refundable \$300 program deposit by March 16. This deposit would be credited in full toward your program fee.

As a Beaver student, you do not have to pay the \$25 study abroad application fee. The regular Beaver College tuition and room fees for fall 1989 would fully cover your cost of tuition and housing for the fall semester. There is a \$285 housing surcharge for the spring programs.

In either case, you would be responsible for the costs of insurance, meals and personal spending money. You would also be responsible for the cost of your transatlantic transportation, but would be eligible for an eastbound group-flight fare which offers a considerable saving over standard fares.

All of the financial aid for which you would ordinarily

be eligible for an equivalent period of enrollment on campus in Glenside would be applicable to your study abroad program fees whether or not you accept the offer above or choose a different program at the regularly published fee.

Because many students study abroad with friends, we have prepared a special

flier to contrast the closing dates and costs for your guaranteed semester in London with closing dates and costs for a friend who might go with you from another college. We can guarantee placement for one qualified friend provided this friend applies by March 21 and accepts his/her place by April 3.

We hope that you will take advantage of this very special opportunity to study abroad and that you will call our office for further information about the London Semesters or any other program in which you might be interested.



Overall Career Day was a success and those students who attended would recommend more students attend next year.



This was the christening of the new Student Activities Center, otherwise known as the S.A.C. There were refreshments, raffles and free pens for all who came. There was a very fun atmosphere

inside the newly refurbished Dilworth basement. And students hope that it will stay this way.

Approximately three years ago, there was major moving of student offices here at Beaver College. Most of the offices were moved from Blake and relocated in Dilworth basement. Now, six clubs have offices on the ground floor. However, there were about 40 more clubs that had no offices. So a large room in Dilworth basement was converted into a large office-like club room. Now clubs have a place where

they can hold meetings in a more professional setting instead of lounges. There are filing cabinets, desks, phones and other office material at the disposal for student clubs. However, there is a small price every club will have to pay in order to use the facilities. A member of the club must sit one hour a week in the club room to monitor it in order for their club to be able to use it. The extensions to the club room are x-2244 and 2245.

The other organizations located in the S.A.C. are WBVR x-2378 and 2379, the Publications Room with the Log and the Tower at x-2171, the Black Awareness Society and the Student Programming Board share an office at x-2192, and Student Government Organization has its office at x-2193.

All of these offices will have hours posted outside their doors in the near future. Food and drink are allowed in the rooms, but no alcohol. Smoking is also prohibited in the rooms due to the poor ventilation, but you can smoke in the hallway. The SGO office has a phone for outside calls and a copy machine available to organizations, although

they have to supply their own paper.

The S.A.C. has also been painted with murals by various students on campus. Eventually, the S.A.C. will also be expanded to the west wing where the gameroom is located. For now, the S.A.C. is located on the east wing of the ground floor. So visit the hall, see the great job done by the students and by SGO, which supplied all of the furniture for the S.A.C., and see what Beaver offers for its most important asset, the students.

"The College Relations Office: What it can do for the students"

The College Relations Office is not a well known organization in the Beaver College campus but it certainly could be one of the most useful if students took advantage of it. The staff is courteous and will do anything to help you get what you need. The staff consists of Kate Cherry, the director, John Fox, the assistant director, Eileen Farren, administrative secretary, Hannah Berger, Special Events Coordinator, and a number of student interns.

So what does the College Relations office do? The office has four basic tasks. One of the tasks is dealing with the media and public rela-

tions. Whenever the media wants to do a story about Beaver College or wants to interview somebody on campus, professor or student, for some general purpose they would have to go through the College Relations Office. It is important for the media to go through College Relations Office so that we can present a "unified image of the college" said Kate Cherry. The College Relations Office, along with directing the media where to go in the campus, sends out many news releases about activities on campus. The office also calls up the media and gives them features stories concerning Beaver College that they would be in-

terested in. For instance, if a professor wins an award or writes a book that does well, the office will send out a feature story to various newspapers and other sources of media. It is good publicity for the college while it gives recognition to those who deserve it. Unfortunately, the office also has to deal with tragedies on campus. When a tragedy does occur the office works around the clock to make things easier on the students and faculty.

Another task that College Relations Office has concerns publications. The office works closely with the Admissions Office and the Dean's Office to prepare the Beaver College catalogs, brochures, viewbooks, and other type of fliers about Beaver College. In fact, the office has so much work to print and lay out that last October they had to start logging their projects to keep track of them. They are now on project 215.

The last two tasks of the College Relations Office can help the students. If any clubs are sponsoring activities that could be worthwhile to the community, they talk to the College Relations Office about getting advertising. They could help in getting more people to attend the activity and they would love to do it. But they

need to know what activities are going on and when they are going to occur. With their big workload they should know about the activity four to six weeks in advance or as soon as possible. Since the office is there for us, I think we should use it.

A third task for the College Relations Office is advertising the college. The office works with an advertising agency called J R A Marketing Communications which has been working well for the college. The agency comes up with concepts and art work which is approved by the College Relations Office and then the agency actually orders the ads. The agency puts the ads in Montgomery Publishing (a chain of weekly newspapers that includes the Times Chronicle and Glenside News), a section in the Philadelphia Inquirer called Education Guides, and on billboards in nearby train stations. The College Relations Office has started Beaver College on an ad campaign that has already won two awards with the promise of winning more.

The last area of the College Relations Office is Special Events. Special Events include planning Commencement, making arrangements for the Honors Convocation, and renting campus facilities

when available. Renting campus facilities includes the Castle for alumni weddings or for outside group luncheons or possibly the whole campus for photo shoots. The College Relations Office feels that by doing these things Beaver College is providing community service, generating income and receiving good publicity for the college.

The last thing I would like to mention about the College Relations Office is how much they like to work with the students. Kate Cherry remarked "It is one of the best things to happen to the office." The office would like to let the students to know that there are many internship opportunities at the office and they would like as many students to apply as possible.
