ARA and Beaver College's Future

Tuesday, January 23, 1990 ARA Campus Dining Services was awarded the contract as the new dining service for Beaver College. This new company will begin service to the College as of Sunday, January 28, 1990. According to Jan Walbert, Dean of Students, and Dick Hemberger, Vice-President of Finances, a new dining service was needed for two reasons, the need for improvements in quality and service to the students.

Beaver requested proposals from various campus food service companies. The Wood Company, Seiler's, ARA Campus Food Service, and Nick LaSorsa's Service were the four primary companies considered. Later, The Wood Company and Nick LaSorsa's Service were dropped from the list of candidates.

Once all proposals were received, a committee of administrators, faculty, staff, and students were called upon to review all of the applicants. A total of approximately seventy five students attended meetings about the

process.
These students were asked questions, met with the individual companies, and visited other colleges already using the various services.

According to both Walbert and Hemberger, student input was very important in the final decision.

Walbert also commented on the importance of saving the College money by using this service.

This saving will mean no increase in Room and Board for the students due to the acquisition of ARA Food Service. "A general increase in terms of the actual ROOM cost is more reflective of energy cost and repair cost, and things like that," says Walbert.

Walbert expressed as her main concern for the need of a new food service as the quality of the College's present ne. "There are genuine violations of an expectation that students ought to have abut a food service on their campus," said Walbert. She adds, "that there should be no tolerance on the part of the college for minimum standards."

A concern has risen among faculty, staff, and students about ARA's past association with Beaver College. Hemberger was unable to comment on this concern, Walbert, however, verified ARA's past. She stated that ARA left Beaver College due to financial and quality problems.

ARA's proposal included a variety of changes for both

the Dining Hall and Chat. These changes range from hours of operation to a rotating menu schedule.

ARA proposes to operate on a continual feeding basis. Hot foods will be served during regular meal hours, with continental breakfast or deli sandwich type food being offered during the remaining hours. The Dining Hall will close for a short time before dinner and after dinner is served. There should be no reason for a student to miss a meal. If a student wishes, however, meal equivalency vouchers will allow you to eat in the new Chat.

In the Dining Hall, an area called the Traditions Line will offer hot entrees, vegetables, and pasta, rice, or potato products. As with all menu offered, ARA works on a five week rotation program.

The Traditions Line also offers a vegetarian entree for each meal. ARA claims this entree will not be merely a

entree without meat, rather ian entree that is attractive and nutritionally sound.

Several other area of the Dining Hall exists offering a variety of different foods. The Deli offers a New York style menu working on a one week rotation schedule. The All American Line, also working on a one week rotation schedule, offers a variety of grilled products. The Dining Hall offers an expanded salad bar featuring seventeen standard items and eight feature items.

ARA proposes a variety of changes in the Chat. These changes include adding several distinct "specialty shops." They are a bake shop, a traditional snack bar grill, a deli, and a pizza shop.

A program called 90/10 program is to be instituted by ARA. This is a corporate program which assures managements communication with students. Management is required to mingle among students 90 percent of the time during peak dining hours.

All the specific information concerning ARA's programs and policies are directly from the ARA proposal submitted to the College for approval.

Life Without Charging?

"It's going away," explains Dick Hemberger, Vice-President of Finances. Charging at Beaver College's Bookstore, Art Store, and Chat may be a thing of the past starting next year. Hemberger stated that it is a time and cost factor issue.

Beaver College's charging policy has existed for many years, and due to the inefficient procedures and paper work, charging may be ending. Hemberger discussed this procedure.

Once a month, all charges must be added up, adding machine tapes made, bundled, and sent to the business office. After arriving there, the process must begin over again, creating a lot of unnecessary work equaling extra labor. This, according to Hemberger, is not cost effective at all.

This extra work is now increasing the business officer's staff work load due to the recent reduction in staff by two and one half employees. Hemberger relates this to

cost cutting measures.

Hemberger included that charging is expensive because of students procrastination in paying bills. "...the art students are among the worst...some don't pay til the end of the semester," said Hemberger.

Interest charges for bills left unpaid after a month, is a possible solution to this problem explains Hemberger. Another solution mentioned is the installation of a MAC Machine on campus. Students would have access to cash 24 hours, and eliminate the need for a charging service.

Hemberger stressed that this is not connected to the ARA issue. The solution for charging problems has not been reached yet, but it will be dealt with in the future.



"I wish the students were notified more about what is happening! I also don't like the idea about chips for each meal. I think changes are good, but they need to be properly executed.





"I think that changes should be made and I am glad that something is being done, but I do wish that students were notified more about what was going on.





"The past few years many of us have gotten close to staff members, and we are very upset to see most of the kitchen staff leaving.





"I would have really appreciated it if someone would have asked us our opinion on the service, rather than just saying "This is what we did."








