# Election '94 brings new balance to Washington

On November 8, the gubernatorial, senatorial and house elections were held. For the first time since 1954, the Republican party has won control of the House of Representatives.

The Republican party also won control of the Senate, changing the entire make-up of Congress. Maybe this will be the change we are looking for. Only the next two years will tell.

In all three races, the Republican candidate came out on top.

This election will stand out because of the outcome and because of the extremely negative campaigning that preceded it. This year's campaign was more negative than in years past. Why? Who knows? This may be the road we're heading down.

It's hard for the average American to sift through all the negative messages and try to figure out who is right and who is wrong. The problem with all the mudslinging is that it leaves very little time for the issues and isn't that what politics is all about?

# Achieving PRIDE: The Gay/NonGay Alliance

PRIDE is the resurrection of the former Gay/NonGay Alliance, a club that sort of died away two years ago. Some brand new students, Jesse Schimmer, Gary Juergensen, Christina Ford, and Don Trapolsi decided to restart the organization.

The club is a social and supportive organization for open-mined students of any sexual orientation. Juergensen, the club's treasurer, describes PRIDE, as a "source of learning and

acceptance for everyone."
The organization plans to sponsor some off campus events such as trips to Philadelphia, and area bookstores. The meeting themselves are social in nature, but as Christina Ford, the organization's president frankly admits, "there are alot of issues to discuss.""

The group changed the name of the organization to gain more regonition. The name PRIDE is shorter, and it sums up the purpose of the group. "Basically,"

notes Ford, "we want respect." While it is not associated with PRIDE, a national Gay rights organization, it shares many of the tenets of the national group. Without being oppressive or by trying to "convert" everybody, the organization is a place where students of any orientation can meet people from totally different backgrounds. As Juergensen says, "orientation is not a big thing. It's just a piece of (one's) personality."

When questioned about the

anti-gay comments made during the Mr. Beaver Contest, Ford uses the term, "unnecessary ignorance." she and several other club members warned against bigoted actions towards the gay and bisexual students. The gay students have no wish for "war", nor do they intend to force themselves upon the student body, bigoted attacks upon them will be reported. Harassment is regarded as a very serious offense here on campus and will disciplined as such.

There are no "set" meetings for PRIDE as of yet, but both Juergensen and Ford assured the readers that there would be posters up around campus and those on the phone chain would be contacted.

There is also a confidential support group, which is not associated with Beaver's PRIDE. This group was organized to help students to feel more comfortable with their sexuality and to provide a network of caring. For more information, call Nanci, at extension 2845.

# Stress of student life can lead to depression

Ongoing research suggests that American university students are more depressed than non-university goers, with many experiencing as much as a 50 percent greater rate of depression than the general community.

"Many college-age students are at a time in their lives when they are establishing their identities, leaving home, and they're under new pressures from unfamiliar sources," said Rolfe Lawson, director of the Four Winds program at Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs, New York. Four Winds is a continuing education program for college students with mental illnesses including depression.

"College students with mental illness are often lost to the system. Our program was instituted to counteract this trend," Lawson said.

National Depression Screening Day, held Oct. 6, was a chance for students to evaluate themselves in relation to depression, but Lawson had some helpful hints for those who did not attend the event.

"Self awareness about depression is not likely at first, or with the first experience of it," he said. "There is no prevention program for depression, but look to see if you are withdrawing from friends, sleeping excessively, or having a preoccupation with 'What an I doing here (at college)?, What's the point

of it?'; or, a change in appetite or increase in the use of alcohol or other mind-altering drugs; and lastly, suicidality."

Lawson added that students who notice such behavior among their friends should encourage the use of the college counseling center or other professional help.

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# New RD's enjoy working with their staff



Hardy also enjoys working with his staff, claiming that he supervises "12 wonderful staff members (RAs)," as well as a team of desk receptionists.

"The hardest part is not knowing when I have to work," said Muller, adding that she has no time schedule and came to this position from a 9 to 5 job.

Hardy also sighted his greatest difficulty as being on call all the time and having no time to himself. But he added that he cannot and will not ever close his door to students.

When asked a final question about what she would change about her job if she had the change, Muller said she couldn't pinpoint anything she would want to be different.

# Methods to reduce the risk of AIDS epidemic

(NSNS)-- Listed below are a number of ways to deter HIV infection:

--Abstain from sex with an infected person.

--Reduce the number of sex partners to minimize the risk of HIV infection.

--Ask about the sexual history of current and future sex partners.

--Always use a condom from start to finish during any type of sex--anal, vaginal, and oral.

--Use only water-based lubricants. Do not use saliva or oil-based lubricants such as petroleum jelly or vegetable shortening. If you decide to use a spermicide along with a condom, it is preferable to use spermicide in the vagina according to manufacturer's instructions.

--Avoid anal or rough vaginal intercourse. Do not do anything that could tear the skin or moist lining of the genitals, anus, or mouth and cause bleeding.

--Avoid deep, wet, or "French" kissing with an infected person. Even though transmission of HIV has not been documented by this method, possible trauma to the mouth may occur, which could result in the exchange of blood. It is safe, however, to hug, cuddle, rub, or dry kiss your partner.

--Avoid alcohol and illicit drugs, which can impair your judgement and immune system. Do not share needles, syringes, or cookers.

--Do not share personal items such as toothbrushes, razors, and devices used during sex which may be contaminated with blood, semen, or vaginal fluids.

--The virus is spread mainly by sex or shared needles with an infected person.

--You do not become infected by casual contact or insects.



Beaver College is happy to welcome a new member, Lesli Harper, to the Community Service Department.


Lesli graduated in May from Shippensburg University with a double-major in Communications and Speech Communications. Her new job at Beaver is her first so-called "real" job.

# Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Geoffrey Haywood





Italy."


This year, Italian style hot hors d'oeuvres will be served. Of course, as tradi-

California-This based band was discovered and produced by Ric Ocasek, formerly of the Cars.


